

## **BLUE ABOVE**

### BETWEEN LAND & WATER

Andrew Hardwick lived for many years as a farmer on tidal land near the Bristol Channel, and his work reflects this experience. The immense paintings are layered with tar, wax and other unexpected materials, and seem to engulf the viewer with their physical presence. A surreal quality underlies his motifs – anonymous stretches of earth and water are made conscious, but their size or context are purposely left unclear. The work captures a rawness that mirrors the artist's perception of the land as he plays with ambiguity, mystery and the inherent power of his subject.
